 The real impact of our education team cannot be understated. We reached new heights with in-person home support, tool and resource development and in establishing collaborative relationships, all of which led to positive impact. See pages 8, 9, 10 and 11 for details.



- 2) Vigorous participation in the Gillese Inquiry, which shone a bright light on systemic vulnerabilities yielding over 90 recommendations that, when implemented, will serve to increase residents' health and safety.
- 3) OARC began to operate and inspire change through our new Vision statement; "Every long-term care resident in Ontario shapes the place they call home." The reality of resident acuity and need for Residents' Councils to operate differently caused a pivot in how OARC provides support and education. While we recognized that Residents' Councils are vital and must be supported, a Council is just ONE way that the resident voice is heard. Many residents cannot participate in a traditional Council meeting, and yet their voice, their opinion and preference must be heard so that they have the opportunity to shape their home. So, our work took on a new, all-encompassing view that embraced Residents' Council education and support in addition to seizing every opportunity to represent the broad landscape of resident voice across Ontario.

2019-2020 was an exciting year, one of realizing that OARC's value is found in supporting the full voice of residents. We look forward to delving into this further so that as change occurs, residents are equipped with what they need to be heard.


